SEASON 2023 - 2024 SOMETIMES I DREAM...

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Dear Friends,

In the fall of 2022, the staff and I began planning a season that would come to be titled *Sometimes I Dream*. We had found a collection of plays about people in pursuit of their dreams – messy, fumbling, grasping, getting in each other's way, and realizing in the end that actualizing dreams never happens in a vacuum. In Lynn Nottage's *Clyde's*, the culminating show of the season, we saw how accelerated the pursuit of dreams becomes when a community forms, giving rise to a renewed ability to power through obstacles.



When we planned a season about the role of connection and community in the pursuit of dreams, we could never have imagined how much art would wind up imitating life. The COVID-19 pandemic had struck a major blow to the business of live theater and other artforms predicated on gathering. When the industry returned to producing in 2021, we knew recovery would be a long, slow process - but through it all, those of us who have loved theater for a lifetime retained faith that an artform that has existed for over 2,500 years could never be fully extinguished.

Lucky for us, this past year has made it clear that our you, our beloved community, have retained that faith with us. Together, we've begun to rebuild and recover in ways that are bringing record numbers of first-time patrons into our building to share in the kind of storytelling that I know you believe has the power to enrich and change lives.

We hope this Impact Report, our first since 2015, will make you proud of the work we've done together this past year. I think it tells a story about how a community that celebrates the beautiful specificity of individuals can create a theater that will not only withstand adversity, but continuously move, adapt, and grow forever in step with its times.

PARTNERSHIPS CONTINUED

SEDA IRANIAN THEATRE ENSEMBLE

ArtsWest and Seda co-produced *English* in the Spring of 2024. Seda was founded in 2019 as the first Iranain theatre company in Seattle, WA. Their mission is to to amplify and give voice to the issues and stories of immigrants by creating work on stage and through imagination and art.

- Seda helped ArtsWest partner with the local Iranian community.
- We provided Seda with a special discount code to engage in outreach to their community.
- This production was at 97% capacity.

An Exerpt from Naghmeh's Director's Note:

'Theater is our temple," I said to this cast and crew at a recent rehearsal, and the sparkle in their eyes told me they agree with me. This time, we have come together in the temple of theatre from different experiences, ethnicities, and nationalities to speak of language, identity, and the experience of immigration. When I immigrated to Seattle from Iran roughly four years ago, I never imagined I would have such a special opportunity to work together with a creative and professional group on a play that's connected to my personal immigration experience.

Here in this temple of theatre, we have joined our languages and cultures to speak with the language of performances and fantasy; a language that does not separate, but connects us.

Welcome to our small imaginative temple.'



THE HANSBERRY PROJECT

Established in 2006, The Hansberry Project's mission is, "to celebrate, support and present the work of black theatre artists."

- The closing performance of *Clyde's* was a fundraiser for The Hansberry Project. The goal was to use the performance to raise money and awareness for their organization. A portion of the ticket sales from the performance were split between the two organizations.



'Lynn Nottage is a writer working to change the world. She writes of what exists and asks us to examine what we are doing to and for each other.

This play is about redemption and forgiveness. It is an important story – especially in the Black community where the Justice system has been used as a weapon against us. The formerly incarcerated are forced into lived sentences that often stretch well after the prison terms have been served.

BORN WITH TEETH | "Who Was Kit Marlowe" - February 11 and February 22

During our run of Born with Teeth, Gary Jones, a Marlowe expert and friend of ArtsWest, led two engagement events consisting of discussion and conversation about Christopher "Kit" Marlowe, one of the two characters in the production.

ENGLISH | Persian Community Day – April 21 st and Talk-Back for ESL Teachers - April 26th

Seda Iranian Theatre Ensemble helped ArtsWest partner with local Iranian artists, community leaders, and businesses to host a Persian Community Day and special talk-back for ESL teachers.

CLYDE'S | Panel Discussion on the Prison System – June 23rd

Mathew Wright moderated a free panel discussion Valerie Curtis-Newton, *Clyde's* Director and The Hansberry Project co-founder, and representatives from The IF Project and Fresh Start Professional Services. Discussion centered around the prison system and re-integration of formerly incarcerated individuals.



ARTIST RECEPTIONS

We host an Artist Reception with each visual artist during West Seattle Art Walk on the second Thursday of each month from 5:30pm – 7:00pm. Artists have the chance to speak formally about their exhibit and meet approximately 150 community members at each reception.


